Works Cited Rules

1. Works Cited is a list of ALL sources referred to in your paper. It is not a bibliography, which is a list of ALL books consulted.
2. A Works Cited is used to identify the original source of a text, and should include the author, the title of the work and the publishing information.
3. Works Cited entries are NOT numbered.
4. All entries are alphabetized by author's last name or the name of the article.
 - a. Ignore "A", and, "The" when alphabetizing.
5. Use a hanging indent for the second and any following lines to indent the five spaces.
6. All entries end with a period, and periods are used to separate parts of each entry.
7. Place of publication is first, then publisher.
