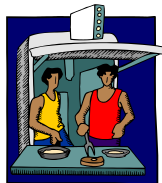

CALIFORNIA HIGH SCHOOL EXIT EXAM (CAHSEE)...Rebecca Berg, Assistant Principal



All sophomores will take the California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) on February 7 and 8, 2012. All students must pass the CAHSEE, in addition to district requirements, to receive a high school diploma. The purpose of the CAHSEE is to help improve student achievement in high school and ensure that students who graduate from high school can demonstrate competency in the California content standards for English and

Language Arts (reading, writing) and Mathematics. Students must earn a score of 350 or higher on the English-Language Arts (reading and writing) and the Mathematics parts in order to pass the exam. The exam questions are aligned to California Content Standards. Contact your counselor or Mrs. Berg for further information or if you have questions regarding the CAHSEE.

Please review your student's report card. If he/she failed any classes,

please refer them to their Counselor to discuss credit recovery options. The Counseling webpage on our school's website is a good resource.

Juniors looking to attend a four year college after high school should plan on testing twice in the spring with the ACT or SAT. Please review the dates and website to register for the test. In addition, juniors should visit www.fafsa4caster.ed.gov to get an early start with the financial aid process at the federal level.

The Fast Track program is available for Shasta College bound students who are wanting to transfer to a four year college after completing their general education at Shasta College.

SAT next available date is Jan. 28th; you must register by Dec. 30th. Register online: www.collegeboard.com.



The Counseling staff will go into the senior classes to assist with their portion of the EHS Community Scholarship application, Cal Grant and FAFSA. ANYTIME SCHOOL



The purpose of Anytime School is to provide an opportunity for students who have failed classes to make them up.

During the spring semester Anytime School, which is essentially Summer School during the regular school year, will be offered. Students needing Anytime School must sign up in January 2012. Students who have failed English 1 or 2, Personal Growth, Introduction to Social Science, Modern World History, U.S. History, Math, Physical/Earth Science, or Biology may sign up for Anytime School in the Counseling Center and avoid having to attend Summer School! Anytime School is offered at EHS beginning in January and meets two or three days per week. Fifteen students must sign up for a class in order for it to be offered.

New Media Center / New Copy Machine

Shasta Regional Community Foundation awarded a McConnell grant to our Media Center. This money was used to purchase a renovated copy machine which is located in our new Media Center. For a small fee (ten cents for black/white, fifty cents for color) students can take care of their copying needs on campus. The generosity of SRCF is much appreciated.

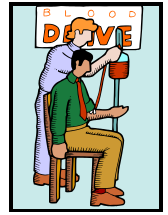
CSF peer mentoring will also be available every day in the Enterprise Library/Media Center during **lunch time**. Computers, printers & school supplies are available for your use.
